




This coming Tuesday will be the last session for the Grouping Feedback and Discernment Team (GFDT) that is a part of the Renew My Church process. I again ask for everyone's prayers as the teams from all four parish communities meet this last time to finalize the draft of the summary report of the conversations we have had regarding the possible scenarios that were presented to the four parish communities.

After Tuesday's meeting, the writing team will generate the final draft. That draft will then be submitted to the executive committee of the Renew My Church team in early December. The executive committee consist of Fr. Jason Malave and other lay people. Once that executive committee has had a chance to review it and make its own recommendations, it will then go to the Presbyteral Council for another review. The Presbyteral Council again is an advisory board to the Cardinal and is made up of priests appointed to represent all of the regions of the Archdiocese along with all of the auxiliary bishops. Once the Presbyteral Council reviews the report and makes its own recommendations, it is finally presented to the Cardinal. He then will have the chance to review the report and make the final decision.

I again ask for not only everyone's prayers but also patience. We should have a final decision by sometime in late January and/or early February. At this point, no one knows what the final decision of the Cardinal will be. This makes it important for everyone to pray that everyone involved will be open to the guidance of the Holy Spirit in discerning what will be the best direction for our four parish communities.

There is no doubt that the last few months have been full of anxiety for many if not all of the parishioners of each of the four communities in our grouping. Thankfully, the conversations have been honest and sincere. Still, nobody wants to lose the parish that they have been calling their spiritual home for whatever length of time they may have been part of that parish community. But, with the declining number of Catholics living in the area, declining number of priests with the ability to be pastors, and more and more financial resources being devoted to maintenance of buildings rather investing in the mission, we will all need to learn how to be a parish in a whole new way. We are striving to form new realities that will provide us with parishes that are of good size with enough resources for a long time sustainability.

There is no doubt that the next few months until the decision is announced will also be a time of great anxiety. However the future will look like for our particular situation, we will need to rely on the grace of God to guide every step of the process. So I would again like to ask that everyone pray for hearts open to God's wisdom and guidance.

Of course, once the decision is announced, the journey still continues. It is from that point onward that we will all need to figure out creative ways to be a parish in the new way that I mentioned. That will be a challenge in and of itself for everyone and will still require that hearts and minds remain open to the Spirit of God who will again guide us into the new reality.

FATHER HAL'S SCRIPTURE PROGRAM

Autumn leaves are already falling, but there's still time to do something serious. How about spending a few weeks reflecting on a brief work of the New Testament, the Epistle of St. James. Our text will be JAMES: PUT YOUR FAITH TO WORK.

This letter is one of the "Catholic Epistles" because the author, James, did not write this work to a particular city but rather addressed it to the universal Church. (By the way, Martin Luther called James a "straw apostle" and did not think this work was an authentic part of the Bible. We'll examine Luther's opinion.) This work was written before any of the gospels were composed and we'll examine its unique point of view. James has much to teach us about our own lives of Faith.

Because it is so late in the season, our program will be four sessions rather than seven. Each week we will examine two chapters in our text. The program will begin on Tuesday, November 19th and conclude on December 10th. Each session will meet from 7:00 pm until 8:30 pm, and we will meet in McCarthy Hall. (The text book is provided by the parish, and there is no charge for the program.)

If you wish to spend some time reflecting on scripture, please consider this program. You can register by calling Father Hal or Julie Kent at 773-764-0615. Remember, studying the Bible is an opportunity to experience the Lord's promise, "Whenever two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them."

CYCLES OF FAITH

32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

“Some Saducees, those who deny that there is a resurrection, came forward and put this question to Jesus ...” In this Sunday’s Gospel, the Saducees avoid their real question. Is there a resurrection from the dead or not? Rather than ask this question point blank, the Saducees try to prove their point through a roundabout, unrealistic scenario. Jesus cuts straight to the question behind the question, citing Scripture passages relating to the resurrection.

The Saducees are trying to trick Jesus. While we may not intend to stump God, our doubts and questions may have more in common with the Saducees than we care to admit. Doubts are part and parcel of life in a fallen world. Still, there are different ways we can word our doubts to ourselves, God, and others. When we’re struggling, truly struggling, about some article of faith, do we admit it? Or do we cloak it with other, obtuse questions to hide the nature of our concern?

Have you considered leaving the Church over the hypocrisy of some of her members and leaders? Perhaps the real question is: “How can a place blessed by God and instituted by Christ have this evil in it? Can I reconcile with the concept that an institution has an admixture of good and bad? What do I expect from others, from myself? What responsibility do I have to try and remedy evil in an institution I’m part of?” Perhaps you’ve wondered about the nature of romantic love, and if God is love, does He really care so much about the details of this particular scenario? Perhaps the real question is: “Can my mind wrap around the concept of a God whose law seems — on the surface, in this situation — to make people unhappy? What is the relationship between the moral law and human flourishing?” These aren’t easy questions, but they are more honest ones. This week, don’t be afraid of your deeper questions! Bring them to God, to someone you trust, and to yourself.
