Second Sunday of Lent – Year B

Lent is a time for special encounters with God in prayer. It is a time for new insights into what God wants of us on our journey of faith.

The readings and the Gospel of the second week of Lent contain such powerful messages for each one of us to reflect.

The first reading, Genesis 22: 1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18, recalls the toughed test that Abraham had to face with. God told him to take his son, Isaac, the "child of promise", and travel to the land of Moriah, up on mountain, where he was to offer Isaac in sacrifice! This request must have devastated Abraham in heart and mind.

Nevertheless, Abraham obeyed God to the point of raising his knife to kill his son. How was he to know that this was only a test? An angel stopped his arm, and God, now satisfied, renewed the covenant He had made. And Abraham then knew that if he was to please God, he must offer Him absolutely everything of himself, of his dearest possessions, and his very hope of future joy.

Another great encounter with God is offered to us this Sunday in the Gospel, Mark 9: 2-10. It was also offered on mountain - Mount Tabor. On that mountaintop the disciples saw Jesus talking with two men. Peter, James, and John recognized them as Moses and Elijah. Moses represented the Law, and Elijah represented the prophets who were sent by God to call kings and the Israelites to follow their consciences and do the "right thing".

As Jesus talked with Moses and Elijah, He was radiant with glory. The disciples heard words from heaven "*This is my beloved Son. Listen to him!*"

The request from God the Father to all of Jesus' followers is that we listen to his Son Jesus. How often do we listen God's voice?

God demanded total surrender from Abraham. Although God spared Isaac, He did not spare His only Son, Jesus, as the second reading says, Romans, Rom 8: 31b-34. God gave Jesus up for us, for our salvation.

May our prayer this week be one of total surrender, total love, and trust to our God.

4 A REFLECTION

The following article is part of a series of parishioner reflections by members of the Holy Child Jesus Parish. We welcome your comments and feedback.

As the season of Lent is upon us, you may have already decided to give up certain things, like chocolate or a certain behavior. If you haven't already considered it, one form of abstinence to consider is taking a break from social media and mainstream culture. In place of this, try filling the time reading scripture, watching Catholic television programming, attending virtual retreats, or watching YouTube videos featuring Catholic teachings and discussion. Fill your free time with the Lord. If you take a step back from our current culture, it may have a profound effect on how you perceive the world. To be able to step back and view the whole forest may help you evaluate your closeness to Christ. Are you too preoccupied with the trees around you to spend time with Jesus?

The shift in your focus may help build your sensitivity to things that are not of God. You may be better able to recognize the overlay of this influence around you, whether it's the divisions, feuds, profanity and profane images pervading our society, or some other insight you recognize.

Immersing yourself in Christ may help you recognize this overlay in your own life. How what's not of God may be impacting your thoughts, decisions, and reactions. Being close to God helps you to stay on guard for this influence, bringing you closer to your salvation. Your new heightened awareness may then extend to other areas of your life that aren't aligned with Christ, such as new age practices that have become mainstream. Putting on the full armor of God guards you in ways you may never know.

The Letter of St. Paul to the Ephesians provides instructions on how to put on this armor. Consider incorporating St. Paul's instructions in your Lenten practices and throughout the year:

Ephesians 6:10-18

6:10 Finally, grow strong in the Lord, with the strength of his power.

6:11 Put on the full armor of God so as to be able to resist the devil's tactics

6:12 For it is not against human enemies that we have to struggle, but against the principalities and the ruling forces who are masters of the darkness in this world, the spirits of evil in the heavens.

6:13 That is why you must take up all God's armor, or you will not be able to put up any resistance on the evil day, or stand your ground even though you exert yourselves to the full.

6:14 So stand your ground, with truth a belt round your waist, and uprightness a breastplate,

6:15 wearing for shoes on your feet the eagerness to spread the gospel of peace

6:16 and always carrying the shield of faith so that you can use it to quench the burning arrows of the Evil One.

6:17 And then you must take salvation as your helmet and the sword of the Spirit, that is, the word of God.

6:18 In all your prayer and entreaty keep praying in the Spirit on every possible occasion. Never get tired of staying awake to pray for all God's holy people



CYCLES OF FAITH Second Sunday of Lent

A pregnant woman was walking in the store and met an old friend. Her friend exclaimed, “You are absolutely beaming!” The new life God placed in her womb radiated throughout her body. It was brightly visible on her face and in her eyes. Transformation and change usually happen from the inside out. It is very rare that simply imposing structure from the outside does any good. Yes, it is true that routines and habits can change when things are done differently. But, for this change to last there has to be an interior renewal and metamorphosis as well. Simply regulating behavior and bringing someone into conformity with accepted protocols doesn’t mean their heart and soul come with them.

Peter was a homeless man who lived in a very remote and rudimentary tent community. He was happy to make his daily trip to McDonald’s and always welcomed a gift card or two so that he could buy some coffee and something to eat. A generous advocate worked to secure him an apartment in hopes of moving Peter out of his makeshift housing and into something safer. Peter finally got the grand tour of his new “digs,” received his own key, remarked how wonderful the place was, closed the door behind him when they left and never returned. He preferred his tent. No matter how much things changed on the outside, Peter was happy where he was. A poignant lesson was learned that day.

How is your Lent going? By now you ought to have a sense of whether you’re really “into it” this year and something transformational is happening. For many, it’s only the stuff on the outside that changes for a few weeks and then they return to business as usual. For others, there are some real inner changes happening that are deepening their relationships with God, others, self, and creation. If we are serious about moving to a new place and radiating with the presence of new life and joy, then we have to clear the way to listen for God’s call. Then, there is God’s request to change things up a bit and order our lives differently. After realizing we have been called and given a mission, we have to trust that this is where we need to be. And then, after all of this hard work we are asked to act. The fruit that is revealed will indicate whether our journey is authentic. The brilliance of conversion will begin to shine on our faces as we contemplate the One to whom we are asked to listen.



*Cleanse our hearts, Child Jesus, to shine as thine
Dwell in this temple’s heart, dwell within mine
Be with us, Holy Child, console us in our days
Make our paths straight, help us amend our ways
Gird us with the armor to ward off the foe
Grant us grace to bear our crosses, guide us to grow
